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NW ANNUAL CONFERENCE

PHOTOGRAPHING VALUABLES

The St Edmundsbury Crime Prevention Panel has formed a small team of volunteer photographers who have been trained by the Scenes of Crime Officer to photograph valuables.

If you own valuables that you would like to have photographed please apply to **CSO Keith Dowyle** on **01284 774470**. The pictures will be recorded on a CD which will be given to you. No copies of the photos will be retained by anyone else. It does not matter if you do not have a computer as the police will be able to copy the picture off the CD, should any of the items ever be stolen or lost.

As there is only one set of photographic and recording equipment available, although there are several photographers, there will be a limit to the number of sessions that can be held. Initially priority will be given to members of registered Neighbourhood Watch schemes.

FAREWELL

After nine short months my bungee cord has expanded to its full length and I return to Ipswich. During my 15 years police service, mostly at Ipswich, I always wondered what it would be like working in West Suffolk but I never seemed to have enough time to study this and see if things were done differently in 'The Far West'. My posting to Ixworth in March presented me with a golden opportunity to get first hand experience. Not surprisingly I found that the police officers were the same well trained, committed work force as they are throughout the County. Suffolk County Council and Local Councils still operate and continue to make stronger links with the Police and Community.

Now the Neighbourhood Watch (NW) Schemes, well they're something special! I will quote the story of my first NW Conference for some years to come when 50 co-ordinators turned up and two sent their apologies from the 52 schemes covering the whole sector. This relatively small group of people must have had control of a significant percentage of the UK defence weapons systems in the Cold War judging by the number of retired senior military officers and police officers within the schemes. Their reliability and organisational skills make Bury Rural the most successful NW scheme in the Force.

Many other factors influence West Suffolk and how it is policed but the biggest by far is the support given by the Community and how they willingly get involved with supporting the police both by giving information and as witnesses. Neighbourhood (NH) Policing Teams are on their way to Bury Rural. They are already a reality in SE Ipswich and are making a significant difference there. With the support of the Community, NH Teams in Bury Rural can only improve the situation further.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my time in West Suffolk but I am off to Ipswich on 3rd January and look forward to setting up an NH Team in NE Ipswich, in this process I will take with me the good things I have learnt during my time at Bury Rural and add it into the Team improving the Community links and the quality of service.

Delivered this way it is most accurate, being exactly what you have reported and not what the recipient thought you said. It can also be copied and pasted into other documents saving the time taken to type it all out, and it will be there for reference until deleted.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH CONFERENCE

The planning for our next conference, to be held at Great Whelnetham Village Hall at 7.30pm on Wednesday 23rd March, is well under way. We would however be interested to hear if there are any particular subjects that you, the Coordinators and members, would like to hear about or discuss. If you have some issue you would like to raise or discuss do please contact your Community Police Officer, Zone Sergeant, the Sector Commander or Peter Johnson in good time.

In the article on Information and the Community at the end of this Watch News you will read about modern technology being able to trace the registered details of a vehicle in a matter of seconds. This is done by the Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) system. Unless required for operational reasons we expect to have this equipment available to demonstrate at the conference. You will recall that in the September Watch News we reported the acquisition of "Metal Mickey", the mobile CCTV vehicle sprouting a plethora of internal and external cameras and microphones. Again operational commitments permitting we hope to have this in operation at the conference, where it will be used to capture the images of those arriving at the conference.

To help sharpen our abilities to note and report suspicious incidents there will also be a presentation, with active audience participation, to test our capabilities, on observing and reporting.

PETER’S PANEL

We’re into New Year Resolution time again. So what are you going to do or give up? I’m sure you all know the first thing I’ll suggest you do, and that is to security mark all those valuable new items that have arrived at Christmas and any of those that may have escaped the marking process earlier. If, like us, you have recently moved house then everything needs to be redone. Don’t try to remove the previous mark, instead put an **X** at either end of your old mark and apply the new one elsewhere. By leaving the old markings you automatically create an audit trail that an investigator could follow.

Just in case you may have forgotten, let me remind you how you should mark items. These should be marked with your post code followed by either the house number or, if it doesn’t have a number, the first three letters of the name of the house. There are various methods that can be used to mark valuables such as etching, stamping and with permanent or ultraviolet markers. The latter two can wear out and even be removed and the former two may damage the item. So choose with care.

In addition to marking valuables with a post code you should also make a note of any manufacturers’ serial numbers as they are a very positive identification. Those valuables which do not have a manufacturer’s serial number, or where marking could damage them, such as oil paintings, should be photographed. If the image can be stored digitally, this would allow a very rapid distribution of the picture to dealers in the event of theft. It goes without saying that any pictures or lists of property and serial numbers should be stored elsewhere than on a home computer in case that is also stolen.

The reason for marking valuables with your Post Code and house number or name is that with these it will take only a few seconds for the police to establish exactly where in the UK an item came from. This means your chances of having lost or stolen property restored to you is greatly enhanced. As important, the police will have a better chance of proving that property they suspect has been stolen does, in fact, belong to someone else; and if they can’t do that, the property has to be given back to the thief. No one, except the thief, wants that to happen!

INFORMATION AND THE COMMUNITY

The past few months has seen a very satisfying increase in the amount of information being passed to the police from members of Neighbourhood Watch and the general public. This direct information is of great value as it enables the police to target offenders quickly and accurately. Do not think you have to present a watertight case, you simply have to tell the police what you suspect or know – leave the tying up and cross referencing of details to them, that’s their job and they do it very well.

Obviously the freshest information is the best, if offenders are active in the area or are still likely to be travelling, you should always dial 999 to make your report. Whilst you may prefer to make a report to someone you know, such as your CPO by calling 01284 774100 and leaving a message on their Voice Mail Box, this may not be the best way to pass on information as they will not get the message until they are next back on duty, and that could be several days.

Unless suspect individuals are known to you, perhaps the most useful information you can note for the police are accurate car registration numbers. Modern technology enables the police to trace all the details about a car and its registered owner within the matter of a few seconds of knowing its registration number. Descriptions of vehicles and individuals are, of course an added bonus, but getting the correct registration number is the top prize. Even parts of a number are useful, especially if they are combined with other details such as colour, make, model and any blemishes or unusual features.

The public made a significant contribution last year to the prevention and detection of crime in this sector, so let us go forward into this New Year with the resolution to do even better at passing on timely and accurate information to the police. You have helped make this corner of our county a better place in which to live. It can get even better, but only if we, as a community, all keep alert and report our suspicions as soon as they are roused.
